It is their goal to teach and delight children, taking them to that wonderful place where magic, imagination, and reality come together.




Armchair Travelers **Book** Club

"Dignity" Celebration



Local artist Dale Lamphere's sculpture, "Dignity", will be the center of a celebration this fall and you're invited! The Celebration will be held Saturday, September 17th, at 11:30am at the Chamberlain Rest Area (located on 1-90 between exits 263 and 265.

The soaring stainless steel sculpture (which towers nearly 50 feet in the air and stretches 32 feet across) is a generous gift of public art to all the people of South Dakota from Norm and Eunabel McKie and their extended family. Governor Daugaard will accept this gift on behalf of the people and State of South Dakota at the celebration and all are invited to join. Please share this invitation with your family and friends.

"Dignity," Lamphere says, represents the courage, perseverance and wisdom of the Lakota and Dakota culture in South Dakota. His hope is that the sculpture


might serve as a symbol of respect and promise for the future. The client's intent in commissioning this sculpture is to honor all the people of South Dakota (particularly the Native culture) and to inspire the younger generation.

For months, Lamphere and his team have worked with an engineering firm and Native American advisers to be certain the work is structurally sound and culturally appropriate. They began production of the full-scale sculpture, starting with the support structure and the star quilt, last summer. A central stainless steel pipe armature bears the weight of the quilt, which has 128 separate diamonds that make up the pattern. They move freely on a bearing spindle system. To reduce wind resistance, the wind moves through the diamonds as well as the perforations of her dress, which is patterned after a two-hide Native dress from the 1850s.


Brook Loobey of Sturgis is the painter of the triangles in the star quilt. Half of the stainless steel diamonds are dark blue and half are light blue. Lamphere went to a paint supply store in search of the perfect colors, then brought the paint mixture to Loobey, who provided the artist with samples. "We would take them out in the sun and hold them up together and look at them," he said. "Finally he arrived at those two colors, saying, 'This is it." Loobey estimates there are 6 to 10 different pigments in each of the colors. At different times of the day, the colors take on new dimensions, Loobey said. "In the shadows or at night, that dark blue looks really dark blue. And when the sun hits it, it will lighten up," he said.

"I want something that people have not seen before, and that has durability into the future," Lamphere says. "If this was just another large-scale classic figurative work, I don't think it would have that level of interest or fascination." Standing at a crossroads, "Dignity" echoes the interaction of earth, sky and people. It brings to light the beauty and promise of the indigenous peoples and culture that still thrives on this land. The intent is to have the sculpture stand as an enduring symbol of our shared belief that all here are sacred, and in a sacred place."





One Book SD 2016



The South Dakota Humanities Council has chosen "Some Luck", by Jane Smiley as the One Book SD for 2016. This novel, the first of a planned trilogy, consists of 33 chapters covering the years 1920 through 1953 while relating the

story of Walter Langdon and his wife Rosanna as they farm the land and raise their five children. Smiley is the 1992 Pulitzer Prize for fiction winner for her novel "A Thousand Acres".

Sturgis Area Arts Council is offering an opportunity to discuss this novel on Thursday, September 15th, under the guidance of Ken Steinken, a SDHC scholar. The program will begin at 7:00pm in the Program Room of the Sturgis Public Library. "Clarinet Madness" in Concert

Artist of the Month



Our September Artist is Erica Merchant. She received her MFA in Sculpture at the University of South Dakota, and has BA degrees in Anthropology and Humanities from the University of Wyoming. Erica and her daughter McKenzie live in Spearfish. Her work has been in regional, national, and international shows. Erica's work uses tension and compression to create preservations of geological references.

Here is what she has to say about her work: Looking at the geological history of our landscapes, what is preserved from a chapter in that land's history is accidental. The

fossils we see today were incubated in the perfect pocket of preservation, not by choice but by accident. Much like our memories, we do not choose what sticks in our mind at the moment of experiencing it, we do not design our memories. Their preservation is not by choice, but also by accident.

Motivated by the geologic sense of time and inspired by generations of transformations, I prepare my work with sensitivity to the combination of materials. The essence of the materials, the origin, and their utilitarian purpose are combined to create a stratified narrative.

The Rammed Earth pieces have meaningful objects from my homelife deconstructed into sediments and layered to tell you the memories of our oikos. Among the strata you will find my daughter's favorite dress from when she was 4 (and insisted on wearing it each day), toys we outgrew, remnants of breakfast together, videos we had to watch 900 times, shoes she outgrew, crayons we shared, and vestiges of places we visited together.

The Burnt Chroma series explores the purity of wood's purpose. The Orient believes wood is the 5th element, and the Lakota refer to all plant life as the Silent Standing Nation. The majority of the Burnt Chroma pieces are made from 'True lumber' - lumber that is milled and kiln dried. This lumber is from the Newell horse stable and sheep yard, milled and kiln dried right there on the prairie. The process of drilling lumber combined with carving is celebrating the intentional relationship humans have with our terra materials. I burn them because the beauty of a charred fire log is comforting, relaxing and reflective of our primal draw to the fire's edge. I add paint on top to create the chroma: the color.

Categories include watercolor painting, oil painting, acrylic painting, drawing/pastels, photography, sculpture and wood carving. A first (\$75), second (\$50), and third (\$25) place award will be given in each of the categories. In addition, professional judges will select a Best of Show (\$100). A People's Choice (\$100) will also be awarded.
