Thanks, Sturgis Veterans Honor Guard!!


Many thanks go to the Sturgis Veterans Honor Guard, as they have donated a check for \$300 to the Sturgis Area Arts Council.

Asking for your help to bring the "Big Read" to Sturgis

An initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest, the NEA Big Read broadens our understanding of our world, our communities and ourselves through the joy of sharing a good book. NEA Big Read annually supports approximately 75 dynamic community reading programs, each designed around a single NEA Big Read selection. Each community program that receives and NEA Big Read grant is also provided with resources, outreach materials and training on various aspects of developing these programs.

The Sturgis Area Arts Council and the Sturgis Public Library are collaborating with a diverse group of community leaders and veterans to apply for a NEA Big Read grant. This group selected a novel titled The Things They Carried, by Tim O'Brien, whose own tour of duty in Vietnam served as the inspiration for the book.

The committee has been working since last summer to develop programs that facilitate a


conversation in our community focused on the unique cultural and social moment which was Vietnam. Further, and perhaps more importantly, we aim to acknowledge the effects of war on the veterans, their families, the nation, and our own communities. Through our work, it's evident those effects are still being deeply felt and the lessons learned may be applied to better understanding those who served not only in Vietnam - but in every conflict since. These programs will be held between Labor Day and Veterans's Day 2017. We are planning opportunities

- * For combat soldiers to tell their stories,
- * For experts to explain warning signs of post-traumatic stress disorder,
- * To learn the history and geography of the Vietnam conflict,
- * For soldiers who served in other conflicts to compare their experiences,
- * To meet Vietnamese immigrants to hear their stories,
- * To participate in related art projects,
- * To experience a USO sort of musical event,
- * To discuss the novel in a variety of times and places,
- * To hear keynote speaker, Dr. Jason McEntee, on war, literature and the healing professions,
- * To explore the peace movement of the 1960s and 70s.
- * To meet and hear author Tim O'Brien in the Black Hills.

Additionally, Tom Rancour of Armed Forces Display and Gifts has agreed to bring Vietnam era packs and the actual things they carried in the field for a program. SD Secretary of Veterans Affairs, Larry Zimmerman, will speak at the program's closure around Veterans Day 2017.

At this time, we are projecting a need for \$7000 to match a grant of the same amount from the NEA. We would appreciate donations of any amount, which may be mailed to us at: Sturgis Area Arts Council - PO Box 901 - Sturgis SD 57785. We are a 501(c)(3) organization, so all donations are tax deductible,

We hope to be one of the seventy-five communities in the country selected for this grant. If we are not approved, we are committed to bringing this important conversation to our area. Our proximity to Ft. Meade and the concentration of military bases in our area make us uniquely qualified to spearhead this work. We would be honored to count you among those helping to better understand and serve our veteran community.





Arts Council Treasurer Honored as Volunteer of the Year!!

Although WE know how wonderful she is - it seems other folks think the same! Francie Ruebel-Alberts is our Arts Council Treasurer, so when we saw notice of her recognition in the Rapid City Journal, we just had to pass it along. (Thanks to the Journal for letting us use this original article)

Telling an organization's story has become an art for a Sturgis woman

and has earned her recognition as the Volunteer of the Year (public affairs category) with the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve during a ceremony in Washington D.C. on November 15th of this year.

The award was presented to Francie Ruebel-Alberts for her years of service with the South Dakota ESGR program. This program highlights employers' support for National Guard and Reserve employees through news release and local media connections. The award was presented to Ruebel-Alberts by the Assistant Secretary of Defense - Manpower & Reserve Affairs Todd A. Weiler and ESGR National Chair, Paul Mock.

"I am so honored to have been selected as the Public Affairs Volunteer of the Year for ESGR," said Ruebel-Alberts. "To receive this distinction is like frosting on the cake."

As a volunteer with the SD ESGR program, Ruebel-Alberts said she quickly realized that saying thank you to employers through an awards program wasn't enough. "I believe in getting information out about what ESGR does, what our employers do to support their Guard and Reserve members, and what those service members do in the military", said Ruebel-Alberts.

Following her belief, she quickly took to writing press releases about employers receiving recognition for their unique and outstanding support to their Guard and Reserve employees, as well as their participation in ESGR activities, to gain a better understanding of their employee's military service. She also worked to establish relationships with the local newspapers, which resulted in the increased publication rate garnering the public recognition Francie believed employers deserved.

"Francie's ability to utilize local media connections has been vital to strengthening and increasing our ESGR media presence in South Dakota," said Ron Mielke, state chair for SD ESGR. "I was honored to nominate Francie for the ESGR Public Affairs Volunteer of the Year award for her commitment and efforts to telling the ESGR story. "Without volunteers like her, we couldn't recognize the great employers we have in South Dakota supporting our Guard and Reserve members."


