Please join us for a discussion of Leo Africanus by Amin Maalouf to be held in the Program Room of the Sturgis Public Library on Thursday, March 23, 2017 at 7 PM. The author is a Lebanese writer, once editor in chief of Jeune Afrique. The discussion leader is SD Humanities Council scholar Candy Hamilton.


From the book's first page: "My wrists have experienced in turn the caresses of silk, the abuses of wool, the gold of princes and the chains of slaves. My fingers have parted a thousand veils, my lips have made a thousand virgins blush, and my eyes have seen cities die and empires perish."

From Library Journal: Written in the form of a memoir, this historical novel explores the meeting of two worlds, Islam and Christendom, through the adventures of real-life Arab

traveler and geographer Hassan al-Wazzan. Born in Spain just as the Moors were expelled in 1492, Hassan grows up in North Africa and as a young man crosses the Sahara to Timbuctu, eventually reaching Cairo on the eve of its conquest by the Ottomans. In the last of his sojourns... Hassan arrives in the Rome of Pope Leo X, who christens him Leo Africanus. Chronicling the loves and adventures of his wandering protagonist, the author deftly weaves into Hassan's account a score of the traveler's more famous contemporaries, including Columbus, the Medicis, Martin Luther, and Suleiman the Magnificent. Enjoyable reading for general readers.

Our moderator: With a bachelor's degree from Auburn University in English (journalism and sociology minors) and her master's degree from USD in English with a creative writing thesis, Candy Hamilton is a retired journalist and teacher, who lived on the Pine Ridge Reservation for most of her adult life. She has worked in addiction prevention and treatment and continues to work as an artist in schools and communities in addition to her work as a SD Humanities scholar. Her writing has been published in a number of literary magazines and won her national awards. She lives in Rapid City with three rescued dogs, a cat, and a ridiculous number of books.

This program is made possible with a grant from the South Dakota Humanities Council, an affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Sturgis Area Arts Council and the Sturgis Public Library are co-sponsors. The books are available at the library now for you to borrow. Refreshments will be served.

This is an open book club for anyone who likes to read and share. Come to see what it's about even if you haven't read on the topic of the month. It's fun and a good way to meet fellow readers.








History at High Noon

Easter Cantata - "Forsaken"



The Sturgis Area Cantata Choir will present its 2017 Easter Cantata, "Forsaken", on Palm Sunday, April 9th and Tuesday, April 11 at 7:00pm each evening at the Grace Lutheran Church, which is located at 1061 Sherman Street in Sturgis. The cantata features music by Mark Hayes, lyrics by John Parker, and narration by Audra Parker. The choir is conducted by Marlene Kotab.

The powerful cantata focuses on the events of Holy Week, but goes beyond what most worshipers know about Palm Sunday when Jesus rode into Jerusalem amid shouts of "Hosanna, blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" Or when four days later He prayed with His disciples in the garden of Gethsemane and Judas betrayed Him with a kiss. Forsaken reflects on what happened on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of this eventful week in Christ's life. Through narration and song, it allows both singers and audience to fully understand the events of Christ's last week on earth and helps look forward to Easter.

Please don't miss this powerful production sung by over 60 local singers from across the Black Hills area. Admission is free, but donations are happily accepted to help defray concert expenses.

Local artist sees designs become apparel

Sturgis artist Bill Cissell can now sell you one of his photoshop art designs and you can wear it.

Cissell started sending his art to shopvida (https://www.shopvida.com) just before Christmas last year, and so isn't disappointed that he has yet to see his first order.

"Everybody is shopped out and the items are hand-made so orders can take up to two months", Cissell said.

The former newspaper editor said that while he took a lot of photos in his job and started out 40 years ago wanting to be just a photographer, he quickly learned that staying with local newspapers meant he had to do a little bit of everything.

"When I was put on medical retirement from the local papers, I didn't look back. I still miss it but this is a whole new aspect of photography for me", he said.

He said he hadn't done a lot of research on the company that, on their website, claim to be working with 45,000 artist around the world. "45,001", Cissell added.

The local artist has been showing his work at art and craft fairs around the Black Hill for eight years and in 2015 had a small show of nine pieces in the Bruce H. Lien Cultural Café of the Dahl in Rapid City.

"I invited Dale Lamphere. He had just been named as the South Dakota Artist Laureate. He pointed out a couple of pieces he liked. Many of those in the show took up the entire canvas and he liked those that didn't. I took that as a hint and really have gone from there," Cissell said.

He did note that the items at shopvida, 19 in all, are not inexpensive. "But, you will be getting a hand-stitched item and probably one of a kind. I really want to hear from people after they receive their order", Cissell added.

He noted that, until he reaches a certain amount in sales, he is also in charge of advertising his work.

This isn't the first time his art appeared on apparel. "My then-girlfriend bought me several dozen t-shirts with about a half-dozen of my pieces printed on them. This time, except for a couple items, my art IS the fabric", he said.

"The Drowsy Chaperone" is a parody of the American musical comedy of the 1920s. This "Perfect Broadway Musical," pokes fun at all the musical theater genre. The story is told by a middle-aged, musical theater fan as he plays his favorite (fictional) musical record (The Drowsy Chaperone). As he shares the recording with the audience, the show comes to life onstage. This outrageous comedy has the fan entering and exiting the play-within-the-play as he comments on the music, story, and actors.

Hilarious characters include two lovers on the eve of their wedding, a bumbling best man, a desperate theater producer, a not-so-bright hostess, two gangsters posing as pastry chefs, a misguided Don Juan and an intoxicated chaperone – all ingredients for an evening of madcap delight. The narrator's personal life is revealed throughout his musings about the show, until, as the record ends, he is once again alone in his apartment. Robert Martin - the dashing, rollerskating, ever-cheerful groom; played by matinee-idol Percy Hyman.

George - Robert's anxious, dim-witted best man who has Robert's best-interest always at heart.

Feldzieg – Insensitive and overbearing Broadway producer who is desperate for his star to return; played by Jack Adler. (30+)

Gangsters - Posing as pastry chefs, this duo is intending to collect from Feldzieg; played by the vaudeville duo Tall Brothers. Need great comic timing.

Aldolpho - European self-proclaimed "ladies man"; played by former silent movie star Roman Bartelli.

FEMALE ROLES

Mrs. Tottendale - The confused, air-headed, proper, and bossy host of the wedding. Female (50+)

Kitty - Feldzieg's dim-witted companion who has hopes of being a star; played by Sadie Adler.


