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## Artist of the Month



Our July artist is Patricia McFarland. Patricia was born in Virginia and raised in Rapid City, and in her early twenties was raising her first three children on the McFarland ranch on Elk Creek east of Piedmont. Her artistic ability was obvious when she was quite young and she began experimenting with pencil sketches and colored pencil drawings. Eventually she started working with watercolors, and then oils, painting a variety of subjects through junior high and high school. At the ranch, she became more serious with the oils, and was commissioned to paint portraits of Sitting Bull and Red Cloud, which were displayed for many years in the Virginia Cafe on Main Street in Rapid City. She also painted two large rodeo pictures from photos taken by her father-in-law, John McFarland. One of these was of Casey Tibbs riding Headlight in the saddle bronc competition at the Days of 76 in the

late 40's or early 50's, and the other was of Clarence Roth riding a bull at Belle Fourche about the same time. The Tibbs painting was displayed in Fort Pierre for years, but mysteriously disappeared a few years ago. She was also commissioned to paint a picture of Harley Roth, a former owner of the Sturgis Livestock Exchange, to be used for calendars.

Patricia (known to people throughout the years as Patty, Pat, and Trish) worked for Dean McNenny at Gallery 21 in Sturgis and enjoyed teaching Tole painting and Rosemaling. She was also employed as Office Manager for the Sturgis Chamber of Commerce, and then later moved to Salt Lake City to follow her youngest daughter and was hired as an in house artist at a dance supply store creating ads and a ballet coloring book. Eventually she returned to Sturgis and semi-retired and started sketching cats! Patricia is currently a resident at Fountain Springs Health Care in Rapid City.



Members of the Black Hills Art Association will be displaying their pieces at the Sturgis Public Library during August. Members of the art organization reside in many parts of the Black Hills including Sturgis, Rapid City, Spearfish, Lead, Deadwood, and Lead. Their artwork will include paintings in oil, acrylic, and watercolors, photography, as well as 3D art, jewelry and fiber and fabric.



# S.A.A.C. one of 75 Organizations to receive NEA Big Read Grant



The Sturgis Area Arts Council, in collaboration with the Sturgis Public Library and the Sturgis Area Chamber of Commerce, is a recipient of a grant of \$11,300 to host the NEA Big Read in Sturgis. Sturgis is the only current recipient in the state of South Dakota. An initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest, the NEA Big Read broadens our understanding of our world, our communities, and ourselves through the joy

our understanding of our world, our communities, and ourselves through the joy of sharing a good book. The Sturgis Area Arts Council is one of 75 nonprofit organizations to receive a grant to host a community reading program between

September 7 and November 11, 2017. The NEA Big Read in Sturgis will focus on "The Things They Carried" by Tim O'Brien.

"The Veteran Community is such an integral part of the Sturgis Area. We are thrilled to tell their stories through our Big Read programming". said committee member and Sturgis City Librarian, Julie Moore-Peterson. "The grant process was a community effort and we're excited to come together again to carry it out."

The NEA Big Read showcases a diverse range of titles that reflect many different voices and perspectives, aiming to inspire conversation and discovery. The main feature of the initiative is a grants program, which annually supports approximately 75 dynamic community reading programs, each designed around a single NEA Big Read selection.

Author Tim O'Brien will be presenting in Sturgis to both students at the High School and later for the public at the Community Center on Friday, September 22. Prior to that visit, the book will be dispersed throughout the community and studied within several Sturgis Brown High School English classes. Additional book discussions, musical shows, visual art displays, and veteran focused events will take place in the time period of the event.

Our partners and sponsors include: The Sturgis Public Library, The Sturgis Area Chamber of Commerce, The City of Sturgis, AARP, Stan Adelstein, Clover Foundation, Meade County Times-Tribune, KBHB Big 81, Meade School District 46-1, The Sturgis Center for the Arts, the South Dakota Humanities Council, The South Dakota Festival of Books, American Legion Meade Post 33, VFW Post 2730, Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 1039, and the Black Hills Veterans Writing Group.

Since 2006, the National Endowment for the Arts has funded more than 1,400 NEA Big Read programs, providing more than \$19 million in grants to organizations nationwide. Over the past eleven years, grantees have leveraged more than \$42 million in local funding to support their NEA Big Read programs. More than 4.8 million Americans have attended an NEA Big Read event, approximately 79,000 volunteers have participated at the local level, and 37,000 community organizations have partnered to make NEA Big Read activities possible. Last summer, the NEA announced a new focus for the NEA Big Read Library on contemporary authors and books written since the NEA was founded 50 years ago. 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## 2017 Veterans Writing Prize

Who: Veterans of our current service members in any branch of the US military currently living in South Dakota

**What**: A story. New, unpublished material on any aspect of the military experience. Individuals may submit up to five pages of material. Material can be in any form. Whatever format you choose, please write as creatively as possible. consider using creative comparisons and vivid sensory details in your submission.

Include a cover page with the author's name, address, military branch/service dates, and the words "Veterans Writing Prize Submission" In additions to the cover page, submissions may be up to 5 pages - 1" margin, single-spaced paragraphs, and 12 point font.

**When**: the submission period is through August 1st, 2017.

Finalists will have the option to publish their work on the SD Humanities Council website.

Three finalists will be invited to the SD Festival of Books for a reading at an event with Pulitzer Prize winner Robert Olen Butler, who will announce the winner at the event. The SDHC will pat state-rate mileage to finalists to attend the Festival event on Sept. 23, in Deadwood. Writers do not need to be available to attend the Festival to submit work. A representative can read the author's work on the finalists's behalf. One finalist will be selected as the winner and will receive a cash prize of \$1,000.00 - second place will receive \$500 and third will receive \$250.


