
There will be some seating, but bring your lawn chair for your viewing comfort. In case of inclement weather, we will meet in the Sturgis Community Center Theater.



With a great deal of financial help from the South Dakota Humanities Council and AARP South Dakota, as well as the National Endowment of the Arts, Sturgis Big Read is honored to have author Tim O'Brien in our midst on Friday, September 22nd.

He will be at Sturgis Brown High School at 9:30am to visit those students who are studying his book, "The Things They Carried", which is the focus of the Big Read in Sturgis.





O'Brien will present "Reflections on The Things They Carried" to the assembly in the theater at 7:00pm. He was born in Austin, MN, raised in Worthington, and served in Vietnam during 1969 and '70 after his graduation from Macalester College. He wrote this novel in 1990 and has earned many accolades with it.

Artist of the Month

Our September Artist is Seth Harwood. Here's what he would like you to know about himself and his work:

"I am an artist native to the Black Hills of South Dakota. I have a background in Architecture and Design with a B.S. in Architectural Studies from South Dakota State University, and I am finishing my M.F.A. in Photography through Academy of Art University. My work has been featured both nationally and internationally, spanning from Los Angeles, CA, to Melbourne, Australia. Currently I am an Adjunct Professor of Photography for Black Hills State University, where I work to show my students that a passion can become a career.



My work is reflective of the vehicular landscape that the American Midwest was built around. This road culture is always shedding the old for the new, and in its wake, leaving these pockets of nostalgia, rust, and comfortable stillness. It's this facet of our rural landscape that I find so exhilarating to draw inspiration from; a landscape heavily saturated with run down automobiles, and neon lined motels. Scenes so beautifully lost to time, that they feel almost cinematic in their presentation. I am constantly chasing that sensation of mystic solitude and nostalgia that is so delicately littered along the vehicular landscape of the American Midwest."



On Sunday, October 22nd, MSG Kristi L. Palmer, CPS – Master Religious Affairs – NCO- SD National Guard, will moderate a foursome of soldiers involved in conflicts outside of Vietnam discussing "Perspectives – 50 years of Conflict." This event will take place at the American Legion (Post 311) Hall, 101 Pine Street, Piedmont, SD., beginning at 1:00pm.

Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

Among Veterans and their families, two of the most perplexing dilemmas related to military service are the tendency toward suicide and the effects of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. We are pleased to have two experts in these fields to help us cope with the reality of each.

On Thursday, October 19th, at 7:00pm, Dr. Bill Meirose - a Master Trainer in suicide prevention and Intervention - will discuss these difficult situations in a program titled "The Road To Hope". This will be at the Erskine Building, located at 1300 West Sherman in Sturgis. Dr. Meirose has served as Executive Director of the SD Joining Forces Initiative, twenty years in the SD

National Guard including three years in the US Army and ten years at the VA Black Hills Health Care System at Ft.

Meade. He has earned his Doctorate in Adult and Higher Education from USD, Masters from SDSU and Bachelors from BHSU.

Experience of a Vietnamese Immigrant



On Friday, October 13th, at 12:00 noon in the Program Room of the Sturgis Public Library, we have the opportunity to meet Anh Nyugen Harper, DDS. Dr Harper is an immigrant from Vietnam. She is willing to share her experiences as a child during and after the American presence in Vietnam and her eventual move to Nebraska as a young adult.

Dr. Anh Q. Nguyen Harper was a five year old child when Saigon fell in 1975. Her father, who had worked with the Green Berets, was imprisoned in Hanoi for 8 and 1/2 years. Her mother, a former

nurse, struggled to support the family by selling fish. In November 1992, President Bush's refugee program re-settled them in Hastings, Nebraska. Dr. Anh attended dental school, married, and now has a practice with Ray Dental Group in Rapid City.

What DOES Peace look like?

Everyone seems to have a different image of peace, judging by the variety of concepts around. However you see it, you have the opportunity to illustrate it in the Sturgis Big Read Art Project.





Dr. Michael Fellner, a retired psychologist who served for 29 years at the VA Black Hills Health Care System at Ft. Meade and at a variety of positions in mental health throughout the area, will address the issue of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder in "PTSD-Now and Then" on Thursday, October 26th, at 7:00pm, also in the Erskine Building. Dr. Fellner earned his Doctorate in Counseling Psychology at the University of Texas. Originally from New York, He has lived in Sturgis since 1975.

The Faces of Agent Orange

One of the major health issues of veterans who served in Vietnam continues to be the effects of Agent Orange. For the latest information regarding exposure to this herbicide, join us on Saturday, November 4, 2017 for one of two sessions: the first from 9 AM to Noon and a



repeat from 1 PM to 4 PM in the Commissioners' Meeting Room of the Erskine Building, 1300 Sherman, Sturgis, SD, to hear Maynard Kaderlik, the Regional Vietnam Veterans of America Agent Orange Chairman.

Kaderlik, now living in Montgomery, MN, served in the Mekong Delta of Vietnam, was exposed to Agent Orange, and has been diagnosed with prostate cancer. His concern and that of many other veterans is for birth defects in their children, which seem to occur more frequently among the veterans exposed to Agent Orange than to the population at large.
