The Faces of Agent Orange




One of the major health issues of veterans who served in Vietnam continues to be the effects of Agent Orange. For the latest information regarding exposure to this herbicide, join us on Saturday,

November 4, 2017 for one of two sessions: the first from 9 AM to Noon and a repeat from 1 PM to 4 PM in the Commissioners' Meeting Room of the Erskine Building, 1300 Sherman, Sturgis, SD, to hear Maynard Kaderlik, the Regional Vietnam Veterans of America Agent Orange Chairman.

Kaderlik, now living in Montgomery, MN, served in the Mekong Delta of Vietnam, was exposed to Agent Orange, and has been diagnosed with prostate cancer. His concern and that of many other veterans is for birth defects in their children, which seem to occur more frequently among the veterans exposed to Agent Orange than to the population at large.

During the months of September and October, nearly 170 24 x 24 inch blank puzzles pieces were distributed throughout Sturgis for individuals or groups to create and turn back in to the library for display in November. The idea was to portray what peace looks like to the creator, or the peaceful process of just creating art. The puzzles pieces

were provided through funds from the National Endowment for the Arts Big Read grant and the generosity of Bob Davis from Sturgis Photo and Gifts. Some of the community groups participating include the Sturgis Middle and High School art students; The Fort Meade VA Art Therapy program; Black Hills Special Services; and the Sturgis Public Library MakerSpace program. The completed art puzzle(s) will be assembled for display early in November, so there's still time to return your completed work to the Library if you haven't. Stop at the Library during November and see the Peace that we've created here in Sturgis!

Joni Burgess is our December Artist. She brings us "The Travelers" series.







A Prank in Three Acts

The Sturgis Players are proud to present their winter play, "Everybody Loves Opal" from Friday, February 23rd through Monday, February 26th at the Sturgis Community Center Theater. Friday, Saturday and Monday performances are at 7:00pm and the Sunday matinee performance is at 2:00pm.

Director June Dill has set auditions for Sunday, January 7th from 6:30-8:30pm. The locations for auditions hasn't been determined yet, but we'll let you know

when we know. June, a veteran director who has recently retired from the Sturgis Brown High School, is now ready to lend her directing skills to the Sturgis Area Arts Council's productions. She is very familiar with the play having previously directed it. She agrees with the New York Post's description of the play as "shamelessly entertaining."

The cast includes 2 women and 4 men. Opal Kronkie, the main character, is a middle-aged recluse, who exists in the general disarray of her home. She totes anything and everything home in her little red wagon and is the eternal and kind optimist. She is set upon by three unsavory characters who concoct a series of elaborate schemes to steal Opal's fortune. Through it all, unsuspecting Opal radiates kindness, affection, and gratitude.

Plan for an evening of laughs and goofy, enjoyable antics. You'll leave the play agreeing with the author's description of "Everybody Loves Opal" as a prank in three acts.

CAST BREAKDOWN:

Principal Roles:

Opal - A middle-aged recluse living in a tumbledown mansion at the edge of the municipal dump. She is an optimist full of unfailing kindness and an abiding faith in the goodness of human nature.

Gloria Gulock - On the lam from the authorities, she has designer-like wardrobe, and Hollywood dreams makes her the perfect naive front woman. She has a brashness that compensates for her insecurity. She seems hardened.

Bradford Winter "Professor" – On the lam from the authorities, the real brains behind the operation, with his high-end vocabulary, college professor ensemble, and sarcastic sense of humor.

Solomon Bozo – Also on the lam from the authorities, he is the big bossman in his fancy fur and authoritative air who talks a big, mob-boss-like game, but there's something hiding beneath the boisterousness. He is shabby, fat, bald and bug-eyed. He is in an extreme state of agitation.

Minor roles:

Doctor - Middle-aged. Rather cantankerous.

Officer Joe Jankie - A handsome young policeman.
