Longmire Author visiting Sturgis

Award-winning author of the Longmire series, Craig Johnson, is coming to Sturgis! We are pleased to announce that he will present a program in the Sturgis Community Center Theater on Friday, October 19th, at 6:00pm. An episode of the Netflix series (now streaming in its sixth season) based on his mysteries will be shown and will be followed by Johnson's talk.

There will be a reception in the theater lobby following his remarks to give attendees a chance to ask questions, buy books, and have the author sign them - along with an opportunity to peruse and purchase some of the "Longmire swag."

Johnson lives and ranches in Ucross, Wyoming-"population twenty-five," with his wife, Judy. He started writing the series in 2005 with the publishing of Cold Dish and hasn't shown any sign of stopping soon. His love of all things Wyoming and western shine through his work as does his unique sense of humor.

His public appearances are as fun and interesting as his novels, so we urge you to take advantage of this free event, cosponsored by the Sturgis Public Library and the Sturgis Area Arts Council.

One Book SD

The South Dakota Humanities Council has chosen Informing the News, the Need for Knowledge-based Journalism by Thomas E. Patterson as the One Book SD for 2018. SAAC is pleased to offer a discussion of

this book on Tuesday, September 11, 2018 at 7 PM in the program room of the Sturgis Public Library. Humanities Scholar Molly Barari will lead the discussion. Copies of the book are available to borrow at the Sturgis Public Library.

Thomas E. Patterson is Bradlee Professor of Government and the Press at the Harvard Kennedy School and is the award-winning author of Out of Order, whose research has been funded by several prominent foundations. He is a graduate of South Dakota State University and earned his PhD from the University of Minnesota in 1971.

In this book, Patterson proposes "knowledge-based journalism" as a corrective for the lack of a "steady supply of trustworthy and relevant news," necessary to a healthy democracy as advocated by journalist Walter Lippmann nearly a century ago. It is directed to all citizens concerned about the integrity of the news.

Discussion leader, Molly Barari earned her MFA in Creative Writing in 2017. A native of Kearney, NE, she teaches creative writing through Community Education of the Black Hills and is a freelance teacher and marketer. She lives in Rapid City with her husband of five years, David Barari.



Armchair Travelers is an open book club that meets nearly every month on the first Thursday at noon in the Lushbough


Room of the Sturgis Public Library. All interested readers are welcome. It is not necessary to have read about the theme of the day to take part in the discussion, so join us when you can.

She graduated from Sturgis Brown High School in 1946 and went on to earn a degree in theater from Black Hills Teachers College. She married Douglas Bell in 1952 and they lived in Belle Fourche and Sturgis, where Doug taught high school English and

drama. Betty had fond memories of living and raising her young daughters in Comanche Court and on Pine Street.

Betty was always very artistic. She sketched, sewed, made elaborate birthday cakes, and even signed her name beautifully! She was also very musical, playing the violin and drums and studying piano with Sister Clement at St. Martin's Monastery in Sturgis.


It wasn't until her youngest daughter entered high school that Betty began taking watercolor classes from Dick DuBois at Black Hills State. She fell in love with painting and truly found her niche painting portraits of immigrants. This subject was near and dear to her heart as both of her parents, Hans Skak and Ida (Matthesen) Pedersen, had emigrated to America from Denmark. Betty was extremely proud of her Danish heritage.

She also loved to travel and made multiple trips to Europe over the years. She was always watching for

possible subject matter in her own travel photographs and in magazine photos. (Her daughter Kerry's hands even served as a model for a profile portrait of an Amish man!) Betty came to know and love each subject who emerged from the paper and paint beneath her brush. She did not title most of her pieces, instead referring to them as 'the little newsboy' or 'the man with the cigar,' and she loved imagining the lives they may have lived.

Soon after she began painting Betty won several awards for her artwork, including a Judge's Choice and Best of Show for her 'Old Man with Violin.' But she painted because she loved the process and the medium and the subjects she painted. For years, her framed portraits were displayed only in her Spearfish home where she could enjoy them and share them with family and friends.

Betty passed away Nov. 11, 2016. Her paintings were on display at the Museum of Danish Heritage in Elk Horn, Iowa, from 2017-2018. Her family is pleased to be able to share her talents in her hometown.
