Auditions for Dakota Players' production of "X is for Zebra" will be held at 3:30pm on Monday, October 7th, in the Sturgis Elementary School Gym. This event is sponsored by the Sturgis Area Arts Council.

Up to 50 students are needed for roles in "X is for Zebra". There are suitable parts designed for every age, skill, and experience level. In addition to the on-stage roles, there are older students needed that will assist the directors and learn how to operate sound and lighting equipment. Two professional actors from Dakota Players will guide the area's young talent through an exciting week of putting a full-scale musical production together.

About the Show: In the African Savannah, there are some things everyone just knows are true. Meerkats are social, lions have pride, hippos are big and zebras have stripes. All zebras except Xena that is! Xena was born without stripes and to make matters worse, she spells her name with an "X". It's just too different! It's just not right! What is a zebra without its stripes? Xena struggles with who she is as she listens to others tell her whom she is supposed to be. How can you be comfortable with your place in the world if you don't know who you are? In the end, the truth is that "you just gotta be you" and...it never ever hurts to have a sense of humor about life!

Students wishing to audition should arrive by the scheduled starting time (3:30pm) and plan to stay for the entire twohour session. NO ADVANCE PREPARATION IS NECESSARY. Bring your smiles and your energy and be your wonderful and outgoing selves. Although there are many roles, not everyone who auditions is guaranteed a part in the play. The first rehearsal begins approximately 30 minutes after the auditions and will continue until approximately 8:30pm that evening.

Rehearsals will take place every day that week (Oct. 7-11) from 3:30-8:00pm. Monday and Tuesday rehearsals will be at the school, with the remainder of the week spent at the Sturgis Community Center Theater. Although not all cast members will be needed at every session, those auditioning must have a clear schedule for the entire week and, if selected, be able to attend all rehearsals for their role. A detailed rehearsal schedule will be distributed at the conclusion of the auditions. Cast members scheduled to attend both sessions in one day will be asked to bring a sack dinner or snack. Parents or caregivers will be responsible for getting students to the Community Center.

Performances of the show will be held on Friday, October 11th, and Saturday, October 12th, at 7:00pm each evening in the Sturgis Community Center Theater. Cast members will be called to the performance location 1 hour before performances. All those cast MUST be available Oakota Player

for BOTH scheduled performances.

Dakota Players will arrive with all necessary sets, costumes, lights and sound system equipment. All they need are your talented and happy kids to make this a fun week for all!! Ouestions? Call Linda at 720-6361

Pierce Emate to give piano concert.



Pianist Pierce Emata is returning to Sturgis! Mr Emata was the first professional artist that was featured in the new Community Center Theater all those years ago. This time around he will be performing in the St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church Sanctuary (located at 1049 Howard St, in Sturgis). The concert will be held at 2:00pm on Sunday, Oct 6th. Ticket prices are \$10 for Adults and \$5 for Students.

Pierce Kagari Emata received his Bachelor and Master degrees in Piano Performance from Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music, where he coached with notable concert artists such as Alfonso Montecino, Gyorgy Sebok, and John Ogdon. He presents master classes and private lessons as part of the summer piano faculty at the Interlochen Center for the Arts, an international summer school that draws 2700 students across the arts from 50 countries each year. In 2018 he received the 'Top Teacher Award' from Steinway & Sons in New York in recognition of his excellence and leadership in piano teaching. In addition to his private teaching practice in Las Vegas and an online teaching roster from coast to coast, Mr. Emata has an active judging and performing career throughout the United States, also presenting master classes for both teachers and students. He has

served on the juries of many competitions across the U.S., and was invited to serve on the jury of the India Musiquest National Piano Competition, where he also performed and lectured about best practices in teaching.

Mr. Emata is the recipient of numerous grants and fellowships from various state arts commissions across the United States in recognition of his accomplishments in performing, recording, teaching and composing. He is presently working on his next CD, titled "Healing Vibrations," following his well-received CD titled "From the Hands to the Heart." Both are recorded on a Bluthner Model 1 concert grand.

The programs that Mr. Emata presents through sponsorship by the South Dakota Arts Council's Touring Arts Program, trademarked and titled Concerts & Conversation, bring a refreshing dimension to the solo piano concert by incorporating an informal and engaging commentary about the music, composers, and the artist's own personal experiences, into a first-rate concert. The engaging way that these performances are presented at once stimulates and enhances the interest of the infrequent concertgoer, yet also contains the level of sophistication for the connoisseur's enjoyment. Artists of the Month

After all the renovations at the Sturgis Public Library, we're now able to resume our "Artist of the Month" program! Our September Artists are from a new Sturgis business - White Canvas Art Co.

White Canvas Art Co. was founded in 2018 by three family members, Derek White, his brother Dustin White, and Dustin's wife, Elizabeth White. Their goal was to follow their passions for the arts, and create a company that allowed them to do that, as well as help others do such. Each of our artists bring something different to the table, and come to that table with different backgrounds, allowing us to explore a large array of art forms.



Derek White: From an early age, Derek showed a remarkable talent for the arts. Where he really shines was through the way he was able to picture an item, and then create it from available material. He used this creatively throughout school where he excelled in his art work, even having his work selected for national exhibits, as well as winning various awards. Following school, Derek continued to explore new art forms, using his previous foundations as a way to continue to expand. Over the years, this has led Derek to try a bit of everything, from photography to metal work, and everything in between. Derek's talents

allow us to work with many additional materials, and allows us to blend his talents with our other artists. Through this cooperation, we are able to make unique pieces of art that incorporate a bit of all of our artists.



Dustin White: It was while working as the editor of a community paper that Dustin found a passion for photography. From documenting local news, he began to expand to covering events and special occasions, and eventually pursuing every avenue of the art he could. As Dustin has honed his skill, he has had the chance to have his work published both nationally and internationally, while also producing award winning images. Coupled with his background in photojournalism, it allows us to provide solutions for nearly any photographic need.



Elizabeth White: Elizabeth has been a motivated artist all her life. Art has served as a way for her to express herself, as well as connect with others. 


This will be the 24th year of spookyness brought to you by the Black Hills Storytellers!
